## RULES AND REGULATIONS

## ALL ENTRIES MUST BE GIVEN TO THE SECRETARY BEFORE FRIDAY, AUGUST 26, 2022

1. An annual subscription of $\$ 5$ or upwards shall constitute the subscriber a member of the Society.
2. None but members who have paid their subscription will be allowed to compete for prizes.
3. All entries should be made on printed forms, which can be obtained from the back of the fair book. These forms to be filled in and signed by exhibitor and sent to the Secretary who will have entry tickets ready for exhibitor on arrival. (No entry tickets will be mailed.)
4. Entries should be made in the order mentioned in the Prize List.
5. Entries must be sent to the Secretary before Friday, August 26, 2022 or e-mail to
maberlyfair64@gmail.com
6. Any exhibitor moving his goods from the hall or grounds before 4:30 p.m. on the day of the Fair will forfeit his prize money.
7. Stock and all articles must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner; and unless this rule is observed, no premium will be awarded.
8. Any article or animal can compete for a single premium unless a special premium is offered, and no premium will be paid on animals or articles of inferior merit although there be no competition. This rule not to apply to "Herds" in cattle and "Pens" in sheep.
9. Any person who shall knowingly violate the rules of the Society or who shall seek to obtain a premium by false pretenses or by improper interferences with Judges, shall forfeit any prize that may have been awarded him.
10. In classes of purebred stock, the name and number of each animal must accompany the entry, and in the case of dispute, the certificate of registration must be furnished. No animal will be allowed to compete as purebred unless they possess regular pedigree.
11. All bulls to be exhibited must be properly secured and otherwise under the care of an attendant.
12. All exhibits not having entry tickets will be ignored by judges.
13. Fruit, Grain and Vegetables must have been raised by exhibitor during the present year.
14. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section of a class. (This rule does not apply to animals.)
15. Animals shown as grades in Cattle classes must be the progeny of purebred sire.
16. As the object of the society in giving prizes for livestock is to promote improvement in the breeding stock, the Judges, in making their awards, will be instructed not to take into consideration the present value to the butcher of the animal, but to decide according to their relative merits for the purpose of breeding.
17. While the Directors will take precautions under the circumstances to ensure the safety of the articles sent
to the exhibition, owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them and should any articles be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment on the value thereof.
18. Should the funds of the Society be insufficient to pay the full amount of the prize awards, a certain percent will be deducted.
19. Judges will have the power of withholding the premium when they consider the animal or article undeserving of one.
20. No horses or vehicle will be allowed to remain within the ring or on the track, except those being exhibited.
21. Exhibitors should apply for space for exhibition to Director in charge.
22. No prize money will be paid on exhibits not having proper entry ticket.
23. Prizes not called for by the 15 th of December, will be placed to the credit of the Society.
24. The Directors will avail themselves of the powers vested in them by section 116 of the Agricultural Act respecting Gambling, etc.
25. The MAS reserves the option to replace ANY prize money stated with a prize of roughly equivalent value.
26. The Maberly Agricultural Society does not assume any responsibility whatsoever for accidents which might occur during the Fair.
27. IMPORTANT: ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE BY 9:00 P.M. FRIDAY EVENING, EXCEPT ARTICLES OF PERISHABLE NATURE WHICH MAY BE SET UP SATURDAY MORNING BY NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M

Earle Parks was a volunteer for many years and was on the Board as a Director. We could always count on him if we needed help. He was born and raised in Maberly and came by helping the fair board naturally as his mother was a great lady to enter all manner of cooking, sewing etc. Bessie May Parks also passed in August of 2020. Earle's wife Cheryl remains on the fair board today and is also a great baker. Earle's towering presence shall be keenly missed at the fair this year.


Helen "Lorraine" (Clark) Fournier
June 21,1924 - February 26, 2022
Member of Maberly Fair Board - 69 years
Honourary \& Life Time Member
What can be said about a quiet lady who always worked alongside others? She did not need to be front and center but you knew the job would get done if Lorraine was there. She helped co-ordinate the baking section for many years, she assisted with the euchre parties and she entered many an item in the fair. A western gal and a corner post in our society winged her way quietly to heaven this year. Maberly Fair will never be the same without her on the grounds.

## The History of MABERLY FAIR

Maberly fair began in 1882 and by the year 1885 the community of Maberly established a fairground. In 1901 the Maberly Agricultural Society purchased two more acres of land from John and Elizabeth Morrow. In 1912 they again enlarged the grounds by adding another strip bought from Margaret and Winnifred Korry. In 1961 another parcel was bought from Cyril Moore and Herb Buchanan. All lands purchased back then cost the society less than $\$ 500.00$. The fairgrounds can be viewed just off Hwy 7 on the Bolingbroke Road, Maberly, ON.

On the grounds you will find a Quonset hut, heritage building, sugar shack, Diagon Alley, Kennett building, the office, poultry and cattle shed, along with a horse draw track. If you are really into nostalgia the grounds still has two outside facilities, one for men and one for women. In 1932 the Heritage building was blown away in a wind storm and by 1933 it had been rebuilt. In 1970 the old dining hall roof fell in due to heavy snows and by 1972 the Quonset building was erected. 1976 lights were installed on the ground and in 1979 we had running water. 1982 was the fair's centennial year and new front gate pillars were erected. 1994 the Kennett building was in use with inside washrooms installed by 1997. The secretary had an actual office by 1997 and moved from the exhibit hall. Also in 1997 bleachers were built at the back of the grounds for the horse draw. In 1999 Gordon Patterson had a cattle shed erected and again in 2019 had it extended. He also had sheep pens built in 2017. Fred Barrett had a sugar shack erected in 2001 along with a poultry barn. Bill Kennett built Diagon Alley in 2002. In 2009 an outdoor stage was erected and Joanne Wesley was instrumental in getting bleachers with a roof at the light horse show.

In 1894 the elation of the fair was seriously dampened by the death of William E. Moore, secretary of the fair. He was only 28 years old. In 1915 on fair day the Perth Courier noted "during the Maberly Fair smoke was noticed north of the village - John Charlton lost his buildings, hay and machinery." Most fairgoers left to fight the fire so you can imagine it was a very sad fair day. In 1929 and again in 1931 the Maberly Fair was cancelled due to economic times of the depression. In 2018 the treasurer, Bonnie Palmer, absconded with all monies leaving the fair destitute. She was tried and convicted, yet the fair has made a full recovery. Not all fair times were good times.

Entertainment has always been at the heart of the fair. Horse racing, driving competition and horse draws were always crowd pleasers. John Charlton had a chestnut mare named May who won many a racing competition and lived to the ripe old age of 32. In 1898 R.J. Duffy took 2nd place in the gentleman driver award. They had awards for the homeliest driver, the poorest team and the poorest outfit. In 1923 Laura Armstrong won a bible for being best lady driver. In 1993 Bob \& Marlene Ambler showed horses in the Heavy Horse show and won Best Draft Horse. In 2009 Wayne Wesley hosted zucchini races for children and it is a much anticipated event. For many years the fair was capped off by a country music dance which was a fitting way to end a good old fashioned country fair. The fair still ends with music on the stage but sadly no dancing unless you wish to dance on the grounds.

The fair was established so that farmers brought their choice fruits, vegetables and livestock to vie against each other for prizes. The women too brought their butter, eggs, soap, hand pieced quilts and all forms of handicraft and competition was keen. In 1894 John Morrow dug a potato to enter weighing $41 / 4 \mathrm{lbs}$ so one can assume he won the biggest potato competition. In 1988 Della McGinnis at the age of 90 accumulated the most points in bottled goods and won with her homemade bread. Ken and Sandy Parks have supremacy in winning most
points in Horticultural and have not been usurped for many a year. There are many friendships forged and bonded at the Maberly Fair and throughout the years there are many familiar names: Ambler, Briggs, Buchanan's, Charlton's, Corley, Downs, Duffy, Ferguson, Fournier, French, Greer, Korry, Laidley, McDonell, Moore, Morrow, Munro, Parks, Patterson, Pospisil, Thomlison, Van Alstine, Wesley, Ure, and the list goes on and on. Jack Charlton President in 1961-1962 is our longest surviving fair member and Dayle Van Alstine was our longest serving secretary holding the position for 18 years.

## Apple Pie

8-9 medium tart apples sliced
3/4 cup sugar
(if apples really sour use 1 cup)
Sprinkle of cinnamon
Dab of butter
Slice apples into a 9 inch uncooked pie shell. Heap them up as they will shrink in your shell while cooking. Spread your cup of sugar over top of your apples. Sprinkle cinnamon over the sugar (as much or as little as you wish) Dot with butter. Cover with your second pie shell and bake in 350 degree oven for approx. 1 hour or until you think apples are cooked.

## Pastry for double crust 9 inch pie shell

2 cups flour
2/3 cup pork fat (lard)
$1 / 4$ tsp baking powder
$1 / 4$ tsp salt
5-7 tablespoons cold water or enough to hold dough together

Sift together flour, baking powder and salt into bowl. Cut in the lard with a fork or pastry chopper until pieces are crumbled. Sprinkle in water until dough is moistened and form dough into a ball for each crust. On a lightly floured surface, flatten dough and roll to approximately $1 / 8$ inch thick. Slide dough into a 9"pie pan. Put in your filling and cover with second crust.
