#### **RULES AND REGULATIONS**

#### ALL ENTRIES MUST BE GIVEN TO THE SECRETARY BEFORE FRIDAY, AUGUST 25, 2023

- 1. An annual subscription of \$5 or upwards shall constitute the subscriber a member of the Society.
- 2. None but members who have paid their subscription will be allowed to compete for prizes.
- 3. All entries should be made on either the printed form from the back of the fair book or the form can be obtained from our website. these forms must be filled in complete with address and email. Entry form must be sent to the Secretary prior so entry tickets are available upon your arrival of exhibits. (No entry tickets will be mailed.)
- 4. Entries should be made in the order mentioned in the Prize List.
- Entries must be sent to the Secretary before Friday, August 25, 2023 or e-mail to maberlyfair64@gmail.com
- 6. Any exhibitor moving his goods from the hall or grounds before 4:30 p.m. on the day of the Fair will forfeit his prize money.
- 7. Stock and all articles must be entered in the name of the bona fide owner; and unless this rule is observed, no premium will be awarded.
- 8. Any article or animal can compete for a single premium unless a special premium is offered, and no premium will be paid on animals or articles of inferior merit although there be no competition. This rule not to apply to "Herds" in cattle and "Pens" in sheep.
- Any person who shall knowingly violate the rules of the Society or who shall seek to obtain a premium by false pretenses or by improper interferences with Judges, shall forfeit any prize that may have been awarded him.
- 10. In classes of purebred stock, the name and number of each animal must accompany the entry, and in the case of dispute, the certificate of registration must be furnished. No animal will be allowed to compete as purebred unless they possess regular pedigree.
- 11. All bulls to be exhibited must be properly secured and otherwise under the care of an attendant.
- 12. All exhibits not having entry tickets will be ignored by judges.
- 13. Fruit, Grain and Vegetables must have been raised by exhibitor during the present year.
- 14. No person shall be allowed to enter for exhibition more than one specimen in any section of a class. (This rule does not apply to animals.)
- 15. Animals shown as grades in Cattle classes must be the progeny of purebred sire.
- 16. As the object of the society in giving prizes for livestock is to promote improvement in the breeding stock, the Judges, in making their awards, will be instructed not to take into consideration the present value to the butcher of the animal, but to decide according to their relative merits for the purpose of breeding.

- 17. While the Directors will take precautions under the circumstances to ensure the safety of the articles sent to the exhibition, owners themselves must take the risk of exhibiting them and should any articles be accidentally injured, lost or stolen, the Directors will give all assistance in their power towards the recovery of the same, but will not make any payment on the value thereof.
- 18. Should the funds of the Society be insufficient to pay the full amount of the prize awards, a certain percent will be deducted.
- 19. Judges will have the power of withholding the premium when they consider the animal or article undeserving of one.
- 20. No horses or vehicle will be allowed to remain within the ring or on the track, except those being exhibited.
- 21. Exhibitors should apply for space for exhibition to Director in charge.
- 22. No prize money will be paid on exhibits not having proper entry ticket.
- 23. Prizes not called for by the 15th of December, will be placed to the credit of the Society.
- 24. The Directors will avail themselves of the powers vested in them by section 116 of the Agricultural Act respecting Gambling, etc.
- 25. The MAS reserves the option to replace ANY prize money stated with a prize of roughly equivalent value.
- 26. The Maberly Agricultural Society does not assume any responsibility whatsoever for accidents which might occur during the Fair.
- 27. **IMPORTANT:** ALL EXHIBITS MUST BE IN PLACE BY 9:00 P.M. FRIDAY EVENING, EXCEPT ARTICLES OF PERISHABLE NATURE WHICH MAY BE SET UP SATURDAY MORNING BY NO LATER THAN 9:00 A.M

#### Bethel Women's Institute Nov. 1937 – June 2023

The Bethel Women's Institute folded this year, 2023. In November 1937 twelve local ladies met and formed a branch of the Women's Institute which is a worldwide organization. Some of these ladies last names were: Allan, Avery, Charlton, Ferguson, MacIntosh, Malcolm, Matheson, McGinnis and Norris. In 2023 there are only a few ladies in the Bethel Branch. Members are Dayle Van Alstine, Rosetta McInnes, Josephine Van Alstine, Edith Beaulieau, Betty Kelford, Eleanor Munro, Diane Herns and Rosemary Kralik. There is just not enough interest in our branch anymore and like the rest of the Womens Institute branches in Lanark County we have closed up shop. Now if you notice the Bethel Womens Institute ladies names will also be found on the board of the Maberly Fair. The ladies always did double duty. The Bethel Women's Institute always lent a hand to the fair, with their baking and sewing work etc. They raised a lot of money for the building fund in 1993 and sponsored the OAAS poster section for many years. They also raffled off guilts, put on demonstrations and displays and participated in the parade at the Maberly Fair. Way back in the day if you were the wife of a fair board member you were probably also an Institute Member. W.I. still stands as a proud organization in the Province of Ontario but sadly no longer in Lanark County. The Maberly Fair Board appreciates all the help over the years from the members of Bethel W.I. It is sad to see this organization fold but change happens. The fair board will miss the ladies who were always there to help in any way possible. Thank you for being our right hand over the years ladies.

## Personalities of the Fair

Over the years there have been many friendships forged while attending the Maberly Fair. We have had many a laugh and people have had many serious discussions while debating the merits of the fair. We have had some colourful characters on our grounds and some very serious folks. Regardless of their personality they all attended the fairgrounds just to see who was and wasn't there.

For example there were three gentlemen bachelors who attended. This was their social outing and every year bought new jeans and shirts to wear to the fair. The Burke brothers, Edwin, Cecil and Stewart never missed a heavy horse show or horse draw. It was the highlight of their day as the draft hitch was their favourite. Another bachelor who never missed a fair was Willard Larmon, so serious but he always enjoyed just getting out and talking to people. Arnold Ure was also a bachelor and our night watchman at the fairgrounds for many years. He had to keep those young Maberly boys from sneaking in and swiping a pie back in the day.

Of course we cannot forget the women of the fair. Della McGinnis at the age of 90 won most points for her bottled goods and homemade bread in 1988. She was very dedicated to the fair always baking and cooking in the kitchen. A little short woman who was as sweet as her baking. Another lady was a farmer, loved her cattle and yet could bake a mean pie. Bessie Parks at age 88 finished in the top 10 at the 2009 Ottawa SuperEx, Ottawa Valley Pie Baking Contest. Then of course there was Carmel Parks who was our very first female President of the fair. We also had a treasurer, Joan Fleming who was a treasure and always kept you in stitches.

Another two who could keep you intrigued were Murray Moodie who announced the horse draw and Stirling Laffin who owned a team of horses. As one person put it Stirling Laffin was like a little banty rooster prancing around especially if he won.

Now today we still have some great men and women at the fairgrounds. We are a volunteer organization and sometimes they just do the work never asking for accolades. Take the brothers Ballantyne, John and Herb. They keep our grounds in tip top shape and also do a lot of painting on the buildings etc. They keep the secretary's office in good shape – that's always a bonus. President Rob Munro was instrumental in getting the new horse draw track and keeps it running smoothly. Paul Pospisil kept us on the straight and narrow by creating our very first policy manual and constitution for the fair. He did a lot of work on improving our horticultural displays. He is missed. Bill Cameron is also a good man to have around and if you need something Bill will find it. He is always there to lend a hand at whatever is needed. Fred Barrett is always at the syrup and honey and keeps our water flowing. The Patterson's – it wouldn't be a fair if someone from that clan were not on the grounds. Then of course you have Ken and Sandy Parks who reign supreme over our horticulture section for the last how many years. Marlene Ambler is another great fair member who keeps the Kennett building in shape along with Sandra Hannah. We do get a lot of great people on our grounds and we thank you for attending every year.

There are so many others that have kept our fair going over the years – too many to mention. People like Bob McVeigh who show cases his miniatures and Wayne and Joanne Wesley who delight the children with the zucchini races. Wayne had a vision and worked hard to bring it to fruition.

Other fairs saw his success and copied his idea. The Ritchie brothers Brandon and Jarrett are always on the grounds. The fair brings out families. It would not be a fair without good food and Holly Kirkham does us proud at the food booth.

Maberly Fair has stayed true to its roots and has a vision to keep going for years to come. Let's make it happen.
